Commitment Statement:

The Board of Directors and Faculty are committed to and share in the MISSION of Holy Family Traditional Catholic School. Our actions will be based upon our love of God and our adherence to the Holy Faith entrusted by Him to the Roman Catholic Church.

ADMISSION POLICY, TUITION, AND FUND-RAISING ACTIVITIES

Admission Policy:

Although Holy Family Traditional Catholic School would like to be able to meet the needs of each applicant, we recognize that acceptance must be limited to those students who can thrive within this institution. Our school is not equipped to accommodate students with severe behavioral, academic, or physical concerns. Although filing an application, completing the tuition contract, and paying the registration fee will hold a place for a student, the decision for acceptance of a new student or readmission of a returning student rests wholly with the Board of Directors of Holy Family Traditional Catholic School.

Tuition:

The cost of tuition at Holy Family Traditional Catholic School is set at \$8,900 per student, per year, with the understanding that tuition assistance will cover most or all of that expense. Scholarship programs are available (more info below) to help parents with tuition costs. In addition to the \$8,900 covered by scholarships, each family is expected to pay \$100 each month for one student, and \$25 per month for each additional student of the same family.

Scholarship Opportunities:

Florida's *Step-Up For Students* program offers scholarship programs for students in need of financial assistance to meet tuition requirements. The *Florida Tax Credit Scholarship* and the *Family Empowerment Scholarship for Educational Options* are available to all students who need them. Holy Family School has people on staff to assist parents with signing up for these scholarship programs. Please see Holy Family's administration personnel for more information.

Activities:

From time to time, parents may be asked to send money to school for various activities. Please send money to school in a sealed envelope marked with the student's name and the purpose for the money (i.e., field trip, etc.)

CURRICULUM

The goal of Holy Family Traditional Catholic School is to provide a traditional Catholic education that embraces excellence in human achievement. And we expect each student to uphold this goal, as a model to others.

It is necessary not only that religious instructions be given to the young, but also that every subject be permeated with Christian piety.

Pope Leo XIII

Three Objectives in Education:

1. **Student Self-Activity:** There can be no learning without the full cooperation and persistent effort of the student. Private study, outside the school building and within the home is an essential means by which learning occurs. Therefore, assigned subjects are mandatory, and completion in the time allotted is required.
2. **Mastery:** Only with the student's persevering application to study can mastery be achieved. We know how important it is for students to master all subjects. At Holy Family they will participate completely in learning activities and objectives to master math facts, prayers, and important facts from all subject areas.
3. **Formation:** The formation of Christian character is the end toward which all subjects and activities of Holy Family Traditional Catholic School are directed, and to this end, students will master the ability to critically think, reason, express, and defend the faith.

Curriculum:

1. **Theology/Religion:** Our theology curriculum presents the beauty, logic, and saving truths of the Catholic Faith. All students at the school attend Mass on Wednesdays, Fridays and Holy Days of Obligation. They are expected to learn and participate in prayers and catechism, and receive religious instruction in the Roman Catholic Faith.
2. **History:** History subjects will be presented to students in the light of Roman Catholic understanding, where applicable. This may differ slightly from historical subjects as they are presented in public schools and other secular institutions. But we are confident that our approach to topics in history more

accurately reflects the true nature of historical events in which the Catholic Church played a role.

3. **Geography:** The study of the Earth's surface, showing differences and interrelations over the world in such elements as climate, elevation, population, land use, natural and political maps.
4. **English:** In the primary and middle school grades, student focus will be on phonics, vocabulary, spelling, rules of grammar, composition, and reading of appropriate literature for their grade level.
5. **Mathematics/Arithmetic:** Arithmetic forms a foundation in addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division. Students will master these abilities and will also develop the ability to read and answer word problems. They will understand the concepts of time, money, measurement, and the calendar. We understand that in elementary and middle school, abstract thinking is something that grows as a child matures, so manipulatives will be used to help students understand the above concepts in a concrete manner.
6. **Science:** The science curriculum helps the students develop an appreciation of the order and beauty of creation and introduces the students to scientific disciplines and theories. There will be hands-on science experiments to help students understand these concepts and theories
7. **The Arts:** Music, Art, and Drama develop an appreciation for the fine arts seen in the light of God's endowment of these natural gifts on mankind.
8. **Physical Education:** The school provides daily time periods for students to be involved in activities that both develop and discipline the body, including PE twice a week.

POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

Textbooks/Workbooks:

The registration fee will provide for all the books and workbooks required by the school. This fee will be \$100 for the all students. Installment agreements are available for families who may have trouble covering this amount all at once.

Playground Equipment:

Sports equipment, available for use by students at PE, recess and lunchtime, may be used only for its intended purpose, and in a manner consistent with the guidelines and procedures as directed by the teacher. Any student who attempts to misuse the equipment (i.e., throwing it or hitting others with it in inappropriate and hurtful ways) will be subject to disciplinary action as deemed necessary.

Uniforms: We at Holy Family want school uniforms to be reasonably affordable for parents, bearing in mind that children continually grow into larger clothing size requirements. This is why our school uniforms consist of items available through Walmart's website. Uniform requirements consist of sky blue, collared shirts and navy blue pants/shorts (for boys) and dresses/skirts/skorts for girls. Each student must have at least one pair of navy blue trousers (for boys) and one navy blue jumper (for girls) for use on Mass days. [Girls jumpers, skorts, or skirts must be below the knee. Also, no sandals or open-toe shoes will be permitted.](#) There are different companies' uniforms on the Walmart website. Here are some examples:

Jewelry:

Jewelry is limited to religious items or a watch and refined simple stud earrings for girls.

Grooming:

- Students may not appear in school in soiled or dirty uniforms.
- Girls' and boys' hair shall be neat and combed. Extreme hairstyles and/or colors are prohibited.
- Make-up and tattoos are not permitted, even "wash-off" tattoos.
- Fingernails must be clean and of a modest length.

***Instances in which students deliberately defy the dress code shall be treated the same as misconduct. ***

Personal Effects:

1. Students should have a backpack in which books, assignments, etc., are kept. Parents should empty the backpacks daily to improve home-school communication. Parents are asked to help students keep their backpacks organized and lightweight. Beverages should be stored in lunchboxes instead of backpacks to prevent damage to textbooks and papers.
2. Designs and pictures on backpacks and lunch boxes should be consistent with the school's Christian ideals.

3. All pencils, erasers, colored pencils, markers, and crayons will be kept in containers and used by all students. If at some point, more is needed, a note will be sent home asking for said donations.
4. Toys should not be brought into the classrooms without the teacher's permission. Teachers will inform parents of appropriate items to bring for Show and Tell.
5. Students should bring a planner. This is a way for them to know what their homework is and for parents and teachers to communicate.
6. All electronic equipment and devices are not permitted and should not be brought to school without prior permission from the classroom teacher. Cell phones/tablets will be collected at the beginning of the day and returned at the end. From time-to-time in the older children's classes, research may be done on tablets or phones, with the teacher permission and observance.
7. Dangerous or disruptive items: Any items in the possession of or being used by a student that disrupts the class, distracts attention from the class, defaces school property, or in any way endangers the safety of any students shall be taken by the teacher and held until proper disposition of the item(s) can be made. A student who refuses to cooperate shall be reported to the principal for further disciplinary action.
8. Weapons: Students are prohibited from possessing, storing, making, carrying or concealing in a backpack or on their persons any weapon or other device designed to inflict serious bodily harm. Possession of such items shall be reported to the principal and corrective action immediately taken, which may include suspension or expulsion from the school.
9. All personal effects (sweaters, lunch boxes, briefcases, backpacks, etc.) shall be labeled with the student's name at the beginning of the year within the first week of school, and throughout the year, as new items are added.

Food Products:

1. Lunch: Students shall eat their lunches in the assigned area and dispose of the refuse in the receptacles provided.
2. Products should be packaged or wrapped so that students can open them. Ice packs should be used to keep lunch chilled, if necessary.
3. Carbonated beverages are not allowed. Please serve your child a nutritious lunch, so they can maintain healthy eating habits.
4. Snacktime is usually at 9:45 a.m. Each Student is responsible for the clean-up of their area.

5. Students are to eat their own lunches. We know parents expect their own children to eat what they have prepared for them. Also, some children have serious food allergies, and should not trade items.
6. Any trading of food items between students is strictly prohibited, because of allergies but also because students should eat all of the food provided by their parents each day.
7. Parents should be sure the students have packed their snack and lunch. The school teachers cannot provide snacks and lunches for students.
8. Proper manners are to be observed while eating: chewing with the mouth closed, elbows off the table, please and thank you when asking for something to be passed, appropriate speech and conversation (no gross remarks or sounds).
9. Gum chewing is prohibited on school grounds, at school programs, and field trips at all times.
10. Grace will be offered before meals and snack time.

Homework Policy:

1. It is the responsibility of all students to successfully complete all homework assignments. If students do not bring back a schoolbook or workbook, they don't have it work in the next day. Please be sure all homework and books are put in your child's backpack for return to school. Your child's teacher will discuss homework expectations at the beginning of the school year. If student is taking over an hour doing his/her homework, please let the teacher know.
2. Parents should encourage the development of independent study habits and a regular time and place for daily study.
3. Arrangements should be made by the family directly with the teacher to obtain assignments while they are absent. It is the student's responsibility to make up all class-work and homework assignments missed due to absence. Normally, upon return to school after an illness, students have the same number of days to make up work and turn in assignments as the days they were absent.
4. If a student is absent due to a family vacation, it is not the obligation of the teacher to prepare separate lessons for that child to complete while they are away. They will be required to make up work missed upon their return.

Report Card/Grading Policies

1. Parents should monitor their child's schoolwork and academic progress. The review of assignments, projects, tests, etc., is vital for the parent to be informed. Students are responsible for bringing home to parents all schoolwork, especially graded materials.
2. Report cards are issued to all students at the end of each nine-week period. If a child is failing, parents will be notified before that time.
3. Grading is as follows:

(K-2)

O=Outstanding
N=Not Consistent

S=Satisfactory

(3-7)

A= Excellent
D= Poor

B=Good
F= Failing

C=Average

4. Retention will be determined by the School Board and dealt with on an individual basis. Parents will be notified in January if there appears to be a concern about retaining their child.

Parent/Teacher Conferences/Communications

1. Holy Family Traditional Catholic School strives to communicate clearly and often with parents. Our website at holyfamilytcs.org has information that parents will find useful.
2. Conferences will be held at the request of the teacher. However, the principal and teachers are always accessible to any parent who desires to speak with them.
3. Although we will have a school employee to answer the school phone, we ask that any calls made when school is in session only be for emergency needs.

Arrival and Dismissal

- The parking lot is available for parents to park and walk their children to class or for picking them up.
- School times are as follows: Monday-Friday: 8:30-2:15. Morning drop-off should be no earlier than 8:15 a.m. There are no baby-sitting facilities at the school, and teachers are busy preparing for the school day.
- Students will say the Rosary every day at 8:30 in the chapel. Please be sure your children are on time. If they are tardy, you should bring them to the chapel and set their backpacks, etc., on one of the back pews. Then the child/children should go to be with their class.
- Mass will be on Wednesdays and Fridays. Student will say the Rosary on these days as well, so we will go to chapel like the other days – at 8:30.
- Students are expected to be prompt. An excused tardy is granted due to personal illness, serious illness in the immediate family, a serious traffic delay, or a medical/dental appointment for the student. School begins at 8:30. Tardies will be marked on the report cards.
- Because we do not have a car loop, parents must park and bring their child into the school and at closing, park and pick them up. This will be safer for the children.
- Parents should come promptly for their children when they are released from school at 2:15. Students will be prepared and ready to leave at that time. Lunch will be from 12:00-12:30.
- Parents who need to pick up their child prior to the regular dismissal time must first check in by calling the school or by leaving a message with the teacher before school starts. When they arrive, there will be an “Early-Release Log” for the parent to sign. They are also required to enter the school with their child to sign them in when returning from appointments.
- Only people on file are allowed to pick students up. Teachers may ask to see a picture ID of any person picking up a child.

Field Trips/Special Programs

1. Field trips and special programs are all privileges that must be earned by the students. These and other privileges are offered to students who illustrate they are mature and worthy of the invitation to join the field trip.
2. Students are encouraged to work for these privileges and maintain academic and deportment levels that will allow them to obtain these privileges.

3. No electronic devices are allowed in school or on field trips (i.e., cell phones, i-Pads, etc.)
4. Individual permission forms will be sent home for each field trip, and there will be a consent and release form that will be signed at the beginning of the year, which will be kept at the school.
5. Parents who drive for field trips are required to provide the office with a current copy of their driver's license and liability insurance.
6. Volunteers may be needed to help with costumes, scenery, etc., for any special programs planned.

Parents, Volunteers, and Service Requirements

1. All volunteers and visitors to the school should sign in. Visitation should be arranged in advance with the classroom teacher. We ask that parents not interrupt classes unannounced, as this is disruptive and interferes with teaching and learning.
2. Volunteers are asked to dress appropriately when helping in school or at school functions.
3. Each family is required to contribute a minimum of 20 hours of service throughout the year. A donation of \$200 may be given instead of this minimum if the parent is unable to offer their services.
4. Parents will be asked to keep a record of their service hours. A service sign-in booklet with "In and Out" times will be available in the classroom.)

Medical Information

Food allergies are a growing food safety and public health concern that affect an estimated 8% of children in the United States. A *food allergy* occurs when the body has a specific and reproducible immune response to certain foods. The body's immune response can be severe and even life threatening, such as anaphylaxis. Although the immune system normally protects people from germs, in people with food allergies, the immune system mistakenly responds to food as if it were harmful.

There is no cure for food allergies. Strict avoidance of the food allergen is the only way to prevent a reaction. However, it is not always easy or possible to avoid certain foods, especially in school. Eight foods or food groups account for most

serious allergic reactions in the United States: milk, eggs, fish, crustacean shellfish, wheat, soy, peanuts, and tree nuts.

The symptoms and severity of allergic reactions to food can be different between individuals and can also be different for one person over time. Anaphylaxis is a sudden and severe allergic reaction that may cause death. Not all allergic reactions will develop into anaphylaxis, but if your child has any allergies, **the school must be informed**. If there are any requirements, medications or Epi-pens necessary, please let the school know so that we can be prepared.

Change of Address or Telephone

It is very important that parents notify the school immediately of any change in address, land-line, or cell phone numbers. Unlisted numbers will be held in confidence when requested.

Fire Drills/Tornado Drills

- Fire drills will be performed according to Fire Safety Directives. Fire drills monitor the school's effectiveness in ensuring the safety of all students.
- Tornado drills will also be performed so that students will be prepared in the event of a tornado.

CONDUCT AND BEHAVIOR POLICIES

Courtesy and Deportment

1. Students shall address all adults by name: “Yes, Mr. _____”; “ No, Mrs. _____”; “Yes, Father”; “No Excellency or Your Grace”. In the event the name of the adult is not known, the student should use “Yes, Sir,” or “No, Ma’am,” as is appropriate.
2. Students are to rise and greet a priest who enters their classroom with “Good morning, Father,” Students are to remain standing until their teacher asks them to be seated.
3. Students are to greet adults with the following: “Good afternoon, Mr. _____ or Mrs. _____” as is appropriate.
4. Students will give immediate obedience to authority.
5. Students should appreciate and acknowledge the skills and talents of others.
6. Students should maintain a standard of personal excellence, putting forth their very best effort in all they do, directing their actions to the honor and glory of God.
7. Students will be expected to pray and worship with a devout attitude.
8. Students will be expected to raise their hand to speak, not interrupting others.
9. Students will be required to use proper English, not slang, when speaking in school.
10. Students will give assistance to other students when needed and appropriate.
11. Students will be punctual in attendance and assignments.
12. Students shall display appropriate classroom etiquette, which includes arriving on time, appropriate greetings, one child talking to the teacher at a time, patiently waiting, respectful listening, working at a consistent, reasonable pace, and honoring classroom procedures.
13. All books, clothing, lunches, and personal belongings are to be kept in the appropriate places and appropriately labeled.
14. Students will be required to apologize for inappropriate behavior, quietly and respectfully accepting the consequences thereof.

Behavior Policies

1. Running is not allowed in the school building.
2. Roughhousing, pranks, antics, and unnecessary noise within the school are prohibited activities.
3. The following acts will be reported to the principal and corrective action will be taken: acts of assault, violence, intimidation, fighting, bullying, or extreme antagonism toward other persons; serious threats made by a student against the life of another student, teacher, or other school personnel; any conduct that is immodest or immoral; any student who brings onto campus any material of an immoral nature or uses any inappropriate language about matters of immoral content.
4. Students shall not climb on or over the trees, tables, or fences.
5. Name calling, rock throwing, and discourteous/uncharitable conduct towards other students are prohibited. Verbal abuse shall be interpreted to include profane, obscene, vulgar, language; racial slurs, inappropriate gestures towards any individuals which have the effect of creating an intimidating, hostile or offensive environment. These will not be tolerated. It shall not matter for disciplinary purposes whether it is directed towards the teacher, classmates, or merely done overtly. Definite corrective measures will be taken.
6. While under school jurisdiction, students are prohibited at all times from smoking or having tobacco or drugs in any form in their possession. Punishment may result in suspension or expulsion.
7. Any deliberate abuse of school or private property shall be considered vandalism, including marking on tables or desks. Cases of vandalism shall be reported to the principal. The parent or guardian will be requested to meet with school officials to make arrangements for the restitution of the damages.
8. Plagiarism is a form of cheating and presents the work of another (or the work of an artificial intelligence application, like ChatGPT) as one's own. Failure to cite source(s) of quoted paraphrased or summarized material, whether published or not, is defined as plagiarism, which will constitute an act of misconduct. On the internet, students sometimes find it easier to copy something, instead of summarizing in their own words. They don't always realize that this constitutes plagiarism.
9. Displays of public affection are unacceptable. After a warning by the teacher or principal, it shall constitute an act of misconduct.
10. Any conduct off-campus that brings great discredit to Holy Family Traditional Catholic School may be cause for expulsion.

Discipline Procedures

1. The teacher's decisions regarding correction and punishment of students in their classrooms should be respected.
2. The normal sequence for minor offenses is the following:
 - First offense warrants a verbal admonition to the student.
 - Second offense warrants a phone call or written notice to the parents and could include some form of punishment (i.e., detention after school, written assignment, work duty, etc.) At this level, the matter should be remedied quickly and effectively, with an apology to the teacher and/or other persons involved.
 - Third offense warrants a parent conference and may indicate a more serious problem. A pattern of chronic misbehavior is incompatible with attendance at the school.
3. The recommended protocol for dealing with concerns regarding your child or their discipline is to contact the individuals in the following order: Teacher, Principal, then School Board Members.
4. Normally, behavior of a more serious nature warrants immediate contact with the parents, followed by other immediate corrective action, suspension, and/or expulsion, depending on the nature and circumstances of the offense. Examples of such offenses would include: disrespect for authority; insubordination; refusal to follow teacher's instructions; gossip or calumny; immoral or vulgar language, cheating, theft, or dishonesty, seriously disruptive behavior, destruction of property, fighting, possession of any controlled substances or weapons, breaking of any civil laws, and any conduct which would offend the Catholic nature of the school.
